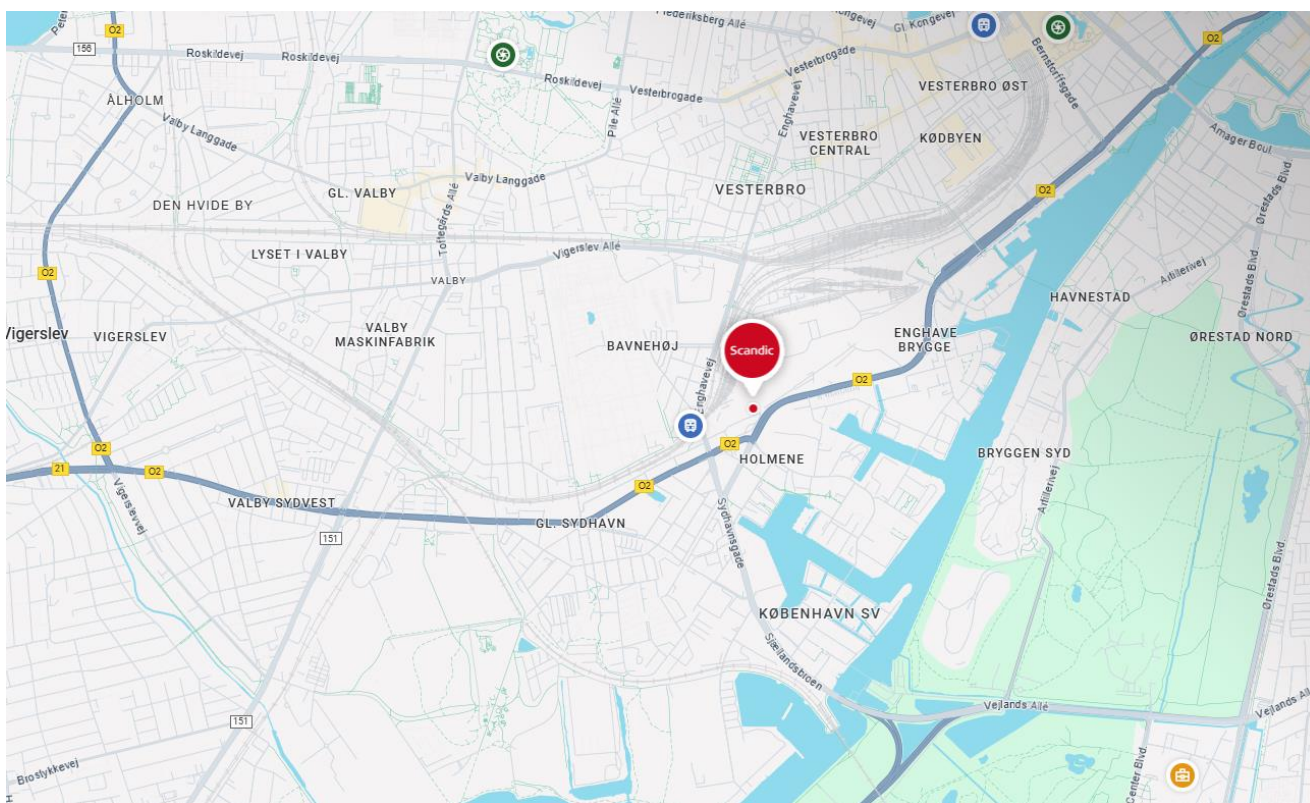


Practical information:

DLM Forum Members' Meeting in Copenhagen, 4–5 November 2025

The Danish National Archives are very pleased to host the DLM Forum Members' Meeting on 4–5 November in Copenhagen.

The meeting will take place at the Scandic Hotel in Sydhavnen, Sydhavns Pl. 15, 2450 København, just 10 km from Copenhagen Airport and 3 km from the city centre.



When arriving

Getting to Copenhagen is easy! Whether you travel by air, on land, or even by ship, there are several possibilities.



[Copenhagen Airport](#) (CPH) is a hub for international flights from all over the world and is situated just 10 km from the city centre. The easiest way to get to the city centre and the conference venue is via the metro from the airport to Copenhagen Central Train Station (Københavns Hovedbanegård). This is also where trains from all over Denmark, as well as from Germany and Sweden, arrive.

Take the train or the metro. The ride to the city centre takes approximately 12 minutes. Tickets can be purchased at the platform or at the metro station, both of which are located in the airport. Whether it's the scenic waterfront, the old canals, or inner-city lakes, water takes centre stage in Copenhagen. Once a fishermen's and merchants' port, [Copenhagen's harbour area](#) evolved into an industrial dock before transforming into today's popular cultural and recreational space.

Copenhagen is frequently voted one of the most [bike-friendly cities](#) in the world, and its 546 km of bicycle paths, curb-separated bicycle tracks, bike bridges, cycle superhighways, and bike traffic lights are part of the daily commute for many locals. The city's tireless focus on [bicycle-centric urban planning](#) and on creating a safe, well-connected, and user-friendly bicycle infrastructure quickly makes most visitors understand that one of the best ways to explore the city is, in fact, by bike. Many of Copenhagen's hotels provide free bikes for their guests, and both local bike rentals and tour guides are more than happy to assist you with getting out and about the city on two wheels.

In Denmark, the power plugs and sockets are of type E and K. The standard voltage is 230 V and the standard frequency is 50 Hz.
